Silk is usually associated with wealth and status, yet in postwar Laos, it was this natural protein fibre woven into fabric that became a lifeline to thousands of displaced families. Today, Phontong Handicraft Cooperative is weaving better futures for women by providing tools and training in skills like fabric dyeing and the use of looms. Silk farmers and weavers value the supplemental income and can send their children to school without growing opium or burning the forest for more land to farm.

Phontong Handicrafts

Phontong Handicrafts was founded by internally displaced peoples from Northern Laos who were in desperate need of work. One of the refugees, Kommaly Chantavong invited ten women to meet at her house. Together, they formed a cooperative to utilize their traditional weaving skills. Through the years, the group has expanded and now connects over 450 people in 35 villages. Basket weavers and woodcarvers are included in their ever-growing group of artisans.
